

## Why send Black/African American Missionaries?

Black Christians can have a unique role in global missions, especially when appealing to others from diverse cultural backgrounds. Many communities of color have experienced significant disadvantages which provide unique insights on the hope of the gospel.

## **The Stats**

**48** MILLION There are an estimated 47.5 million people who self-identified as Black in the U.S. (2020 United States Census) Among these, over 9% were born overseas in countries such as Ethiopia, Ghana, Haiti, Jamaica, Kenya, Liberia, Nigeria, Somalia, and South Africa. (2023 American Community Survey)

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The U.S. Black population accounts for the second largest ethnic minority segment at 14.2%. (2020 United States Census) The Black population has seen growth of 32% since the year 2000, but the Black foreign-born have almost doubled from 2.4 million in 2000 to 4.3 today. (2023 American Community Survey)

AROUND

Right now, there are 3,899 Southern Baptist African American congregations in the U.S. with 873,035 members. In addition, there are 523 congregations from Africa and Haiti with a total of 57,708 members.
